


Let's Talk About Art

Maybe you know some already, maybe some are new to you.




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Abstract Art

Art that does not represent an accurate picture or image.

Instead, uses shapes, colors, forms and gestural marks to create a composition.



Cultural

Relating to the ideas, customs and social behavior of a society.


This can include the knowledge, beliefs, arts, laws, customs, capabilities, and habits of a group of people.

Geometric

A style or art decorated with mostly lines and shapes.



Rotation

The motion of a figure around a fixed point, also known as a turn.


After completing a rotation, an object will be the same shape and size, but in a different position.

We ask a series of questions to encourage learners to think about and engage with art for themselves.

HOW TO LOOK AT ART

DESCRIPTION

A visual inventory is made

WHAT DO YOU SEE?

LINE, SHAPE, COLOR, TEXTURE, SPACE, MEDIA/ MATERIALS USED

ANALYSIS

Relationships among the design elements are noted

BALANCE, RHYTHM, CONTRAST, PROPORTION, EMPHASIS

INTERPRETATION

An attempt is made to determine the idea which seems to unify all of the separate traits of the artwork

WHAT IS THE MESSAGE OF THE ARTIST?

JUDGMENT

The viewer may form a judgment about the work
Connect/ Evaluation

HOW DO I RELATE TO THIS PIECE OF ART?

Description

Take some time to examine what you see. Try and give some details.

For example, what colors or shapes do you notice?



Analysis

Now think about scale and size.

How do you think the artist planed the different parts of this artwork?

What materials?

Why gold?



Interpretation

What do these shapes and colors remind you of?

What do these shapes/colors mean to you?

What could have inspired the artist to create this?



Judgement

Which angle frames this work best?

Imagine rotating, flipping or altering the image to answer the question.

Tell me a story about this artwork.

Art Activity Instructions and Materials





Fragmented Collage

Inspired by Eamon Oré-Gíron's use of overlapping colors and shapes, students will create their own Fragmented Collage.

Students are encouraged to choose different patterns for a cut-out collage activity.

Materials

Page 1 of 1

- Construction Paper
- Collage paper
- Scissors
- Colored pencils
- Glue stick
- Black scratch board (optional)



Step 1 of 8

Think about which shape you will draw, as well as which colors and different paper types you want to use for your Fragmented Collage.

This artist chose to draw on construction paper first.



Step 2 of 8

Using either patterned sheets of paper or construction paper, draw a quick outline sketch of a shape or object.

For their Fragmented Collage, this artist drew the outline of a fish.



Step 3 of 8

Cut out the shapes or object outlined on your first piece of paper.

For their Fragmented Collage, this artist started with yellow construction paper for their template.



Step 4 of 8

This will serve as your cut out template for your collage. Use your template to compose, layer, shadow or any other combination you can imagine.

This artist cut out their fish outline from their construction paper.



Step 5 of 8

Place your template on a different colored or different patterned paper. Think about creating a striking contrast.

This artist chose to place their fish template on a piece of patterned paper with dark colors and a bird pattern.



Step 6 of 8

Cut around the template to produce another shape for your Fragmented Collage.

Repeat this process as often as you like.



Step 7 of 8

Experiment with the arrangement of your cut outs. Think about the composition of your Fragmented Collage. You may reuse your template.

This artist chose to place the two cutouts side by side to create a symmetrical, or mirror image.

When you are happy with your arrangement, glue them down on background piece of construction paper.

Get creative! Think about adding 3-D elements. Folding and over lapping layers is also encouraged.
