Born in 1984 in the Dominican Republic, Hulda Guzmán creates colorful landscape paintings that celebrate her Caribbean identity.





Harmony

A pleasing combination or arrangement of different things. When things are in harmony, they go together well.

This is the Hall of Supreme Harmony, in Beijing, China.



Contrast

To be different, especially in a way that is very obvious.

In art, contrast is achieved when opposite elements are arranged together.

Complimentary Color

A pair of colors that are very different from each other. Complimentary colors are opposite of each other on the color wheel.

Analogous Color

A pair of colors that are similar in some way. Analogous colors are colors that are next to each other on the color wheel.



Narrative

Having the form of a story.

Retelling a series of events from at least one point of view.



Scale

The size or level of something, especially in comparison to something else.

In many tropical parts of the world, it is grown as an ornamental tree and in English it is given the name royal poinciana, flamboyant, flame of the forest, or flame tree.

In the Caribbean, it is featured in many Dominican and Puerto Rican paintings.

We ask a series of questions to encourage learners to think about and engage with art for themselves.

HOW TO LOOK AT ART

DESCRIPTION

A visual inventory is made

WHAT DO YOU SEE?

LINE, SHAPE, COLOR, TEXTURE, SPACE, MEDIA/ MATERIALS USED

ANALYSIS

Relationships among the design elements are noted

BALANCE, RHYTHM, CONTRAST, PROPORTION, EMPHASIS

INTERPRETATION

An attempt is made to determine the idea which seems to unify all of the separate traits of the artwork

WHAT IS THE MESSAGE OF THE ARTIST?

JUDGMENT

The viewer may form a judgment about the work


HOW DO I RELATE TO THIS PIECE OF ART?

Pay special attention to the colors, scale, characters and surroundings in the artwork.




Analysis

What areas pop out most? What areas take a little more time to notice?


How do the characters relate to their surroundings?

Imagine you were a character here: what would you hear, smell, see, etc.?


Place yourself within this artwork. What would you be doing and why?

Swatches and a Story

Inspired by artist Hulda Guzman's use of color and elements of harmony, students will create their own Switched-up Swatches.

Using a color wheel, students will experiment creating their own color swatches by using harmonious and contrasting colors

Materials

Page 1 of 1

- Colored paper or construction paper
- Glue stick
- Scissors
- Colored pencils
- A color wheel

Step 1 of 7

Think about your room, neighborhood, or favorite place. Which color from your selection of construction paper reminds you most reminds you of that space?

Remove the piece of colored paper from your art kit and lay it on the table.

This artist chose to start with pink paper for their Swatch and a Story.



Step 2 of 7

Find the same color pencil in your kit as your paper. Layer it over your paper to create two harmonious colors.

This artist chose pink to match their pink paper for their Swatch and a Story.

Step 3 of 7

Continue you color swatch with a color that is next to your chosen color on the color wheel. Use it to create more harmonious colors.

To create even more, layer different colors right on top of each other!

This artist chose other warm colors close to pink on the color wheel, like red and orange.



Step 4 of 7

Let's look at the color wheel again to find a few colors that are the opposite of your chosen color. These are colors that might stand out next to each other.

Create another color swatch using these contrasting colors. How would you describe these colors?

This artist created another color swatch using cool colors.



Step 5 of 7

Flip the paper over and continue to think about your chosen space.

Cut different shapes from your colorful papers to begin creating some larger elements of the space.

Here, the artist chose to create shapes representing a sun and a lake.

Step 6 of 7

Arrange and glue the shapes down to begin shaping your environment.

This artist is continuing their Swatch and a Story with a different shapes on the back of their first artwork.

Draw yourself or some characters in your narrative. Tell a story about the place you chose to depict in your Swatch and a Story!


