

Ingenuity


Inventive skill or imagination; cleverness. The ability to solve difficult problems, often in original, clever, and inventive ways.

PAMM Teaching Artists use the Inquiry Method.

We ask a series of questions to encourage learners to think about and engage with art for themselves.

HOW TO LOOK AT ART

DESCRIPTION

A visual inventory is made

WHAT DO YOU SEE?

LINE, SHAPE, COLOR, TEXTURE, SPACE, MEDIA/ MATERIALS USED

ANALYSIS

Relationships among the design elements are noted

BALANCE, RHYTHM, CONTRAST, PROPORTION, EMPHASIS

INTERPRETATION

An attempt is made to determine the idea which seems to unify all of the separate traits of the artwork

WHAT IS THE MESSAGE OF THE ARTIST?

JUDGMENT

The viewer may form a judgment about the work

HOW DO I RELATE TO THIS PIECE OF ART?

Description

Please describe this image, focus first on the foreground details, or subjects of this artwork.

Now, describe the setting and focus on the background details.



Analysis

Who is this man and what kind of animal does he have here?

Where do think this animal's natural habitat could be? What could it be like?



Interpretation

Do you think he trained / tamed (domesticate) this animal? How? Why?

What kind of relationship do you believe this person has with this animal?



Judgement

Do you own an animal? If you could own any animal, which one? Why?

What could you train your animal to do? Why?

Instructions and Materials





Collaged Narrative

Imagine sharing your favorite skill or talent with any animal, real or imaginary.

Find images that tell the story of you teaching your animal friend something that can bring bring you both joy!

Materials

Page 1 of 1

- Tape, any kind will do
- Construction paper
- Scissors
- Old magazines, books, or other print material you can cut











Step 1 of 5

Students will receive scissors, tape, and two to three old magazine pages.

Students will look through old magazines for human figures, animal figures as well as landscapes for their Collaged Narrative.

Step 2 of 5

Once students have chosen their images, they will then cut out 3 images total: one human figure, one animal figure and an image of any setting (indoors /outdoors) of their choice.

This artist has chosen a dancer as the human representation of her Collaged Narrative.

Step 3 of 5

Students will then use one piece of tape per image to secure images and to compose a narrative image.

This artist has attached a small loop of tape to the back of her dancer cut-out.

Step 4 of 5

Students will experiment with the placement of their animal and human representations.

Repeat the process and feel free to move and rearrange images before the cut-out images are taped down to the construction paper.

Step 5 of 5

This artist chose a Monarch Butterfly as their animal, and in their Collage Narrative, they are sharing Dance with this creature, because they love dancing.

Each student will then have a chance to narrate a short scene explaining their characters' relationship.


