




# Let's Talk About Art



### **Portrait**


A portrait is a representation of a particular person. A self-portrait is a portrait of the artist by the artist

We ask a series of questions to encourage learners to think about and engage with art for themselves.

#### **ANALYSIS**

Relationships among the design elements are noted

BALANCE, RHYTHM, CONTRAST, PROPORTION, EMPHASIS

#### INTERPRETATION

An attempt is made to determine the idea which seems to unify all of the separate traits of the artwork

Which hairstyles last longest?



# Let's Make Art

**Art Activity Instructions and Materials** 

### **Mosaic PortraiTales**

Inspired by Devan Shimoyama's use of layered portraits about identity, students will create their own Mosaic PotraitTales.

Students will compose an abstracted selfportrait using at least three identifying objects or symbols that represent their past, present, and future.

#### **Materials**


Page 1 of 1

Students may use whatever variety of materials; they will need three items to make their Mosaic PortaiTales.


#### This example uses:

- Black card stock paper and patterned collage paper (you can also use crayons or colored pencils to add decorations)
- Scissors
- Glitter/metallic contact paper
- Rhinestone stickers
- Washi tape (regular tape works fine too)









Step 1 of 7

Students will draw or find images of three objects that represent their past, present, and future. Cut out your images.

In this example, the artist drew a bull and leaf on on black card stock and cut them out. This artist also cut out a streetlamp from a piece of collage paper.







Step 2 of 7

Once the images of the past, present and future are cut out, students are encouraged to decorate and embellish their images.

This artist chose glitter contact paper to decorate their Mosaic PortraiTale.



Step 3 of 7

Decorate your first image with your chosen materials. Make sure to cover the image, placing different shapes and colors next to each other.

This artist chose to decorate their first image, a bull, with green and gold metallic contact paper.



Step 4 of 7

Move onto your next image. Decorate it with a different material if you have more than one.

This artist's second image is a leaf. They chose metallic washi tape to decorate the second image of their Mosaic PortraiTale.



Step 5 of 7

Make sure to cover your three images with different colors and shapes as decorations. This is what makes it a mosaic!

This artist used green and gold washi tape to cover most of their second image.

Step 6 of 7

Move on to your third image. Try a third way to decorate the final image of you Mosaic PortraiTale.

This artist chose rhinestones to decorate their cut out of a streetlamp.

Think about how the placement of your three images represent the many layered dimensions of your identity, and your past, present, and future.

Photography your masterpiece Mosaic PortraiTale!


